

Nerve Tumours

NF, the new medical term for Neurofibromatosis Type 1 (NF1), NF2-Schwannomatosis (NF2) and Schwannomatosis (SWN) causes tumours to grow on nerve endings. Whilst some children and adults may live a normal life, others of those with NF could have a multitude of medical, physical, and psychological conditions. 60% of those with the condition have learning disabilities and up to 75% are registered disabled. People live in constant pain.

NF is a genetic condition. It cannot be transmitted by touch, and it is not contagious.

- Approximately 26,500 people in the UK are affected by NF
- → Up to 30% of NF1 patients will be registered as disabled (2010 Equality Act)
 - Up to 75% of NF2 patients will be registered as disabled (2010 Equality Act)

INCREASE AWARENESS AND UNDERSTANDING

People with NF either work in or visit hospitality venues everyday, and for team members it's important to be aware that these people may look different. They could have:

- Café au lait spots: Flat, light to dark brown birthmarks that can appear anywhere on the body, but are most common on the chest, back, pelvis, elbows, and knees.
- Neurofibromas: Soft, non-cancerous tumours that can appear on or under the skin.

 These bumps can be small and round, or they can form a larger growth from multiple nerves.
- Freckles: Clusters of freckles in unusual places, such as the armpits, groin, and under the breast.
